

EXAMPLE OF ANALYSIS

INDIAN CODE OF CRIMINAL PROCEDURE

65. Procedure when service cannot be effected as before provided:

If service cannot by the exercise of due diligence be effected as provided in section 62, section 63 or section 64, the serving officer shall affix one of the duplicates of the summons to some conspicuous part of the house or homestead in which the person summoned ordinarily resides; and thereupon the Court, after making such inquiries as it thinks fit, may either declare that the summons has been duly served or order fresh service in such manner as it considers proper.

RE-WRITING OF SECTION 65 WITH FINITE VERBS

If service cannot be effected by the exercise of due diligence

As provided in section 62, section 63 or section 64,

The serving officer shall affix one of the duplicates of the summons to some conspicuous part of the house or homestead

In which the person resides,

Who is summoned ordinarily,

And, thereupon, after making such inquiries

As it thinks fit,

The Court may either declare

That the summons has been duly served

Or court may order fresh service in such manner

As it considers proper

SENTENCE ANALYSIS OF SECTION 65

MODIFIERS IN SECTION: Noun, Verb, Prepositional and Participle phrases.

CLAUSES IN SECTION: There are eleven clauses

1. If service cannot be effected by the exercise of due diligence (*Subordinate clause*)
2. As provided in section 62, section 63 or section 64 (*Subordinate clause*)
3. The serving officer shall affix one of the duplicates of the summons to some conspicuous part of the house or homestead (*Independent clause*)
4. In which the person resides (*Subordinate clause*)
5. Who is summoned ordinarily (*Independent clause*)
6. And, thereupon, after making such inquiries (*Subordinate clause*)
7. As it thinks fit (*Subordinate clause*)
8. The Court may either declare (*Independent clause*)
9. That the summons has been duly served (*Subordinate clause*)
10. Or court may order fresh service in such manner (*Independent clause*)
11. As it considers proper (*Subordinate clause*)

CLASSIFICATION OF SENTENCE: It is a compound-complex-sentence with five independent clauses and six Subordinate clauses)
